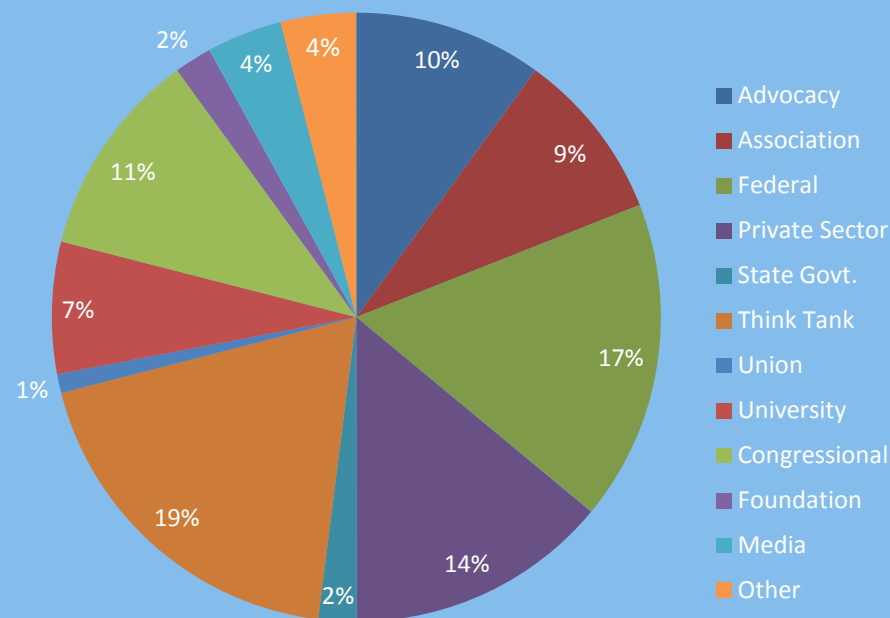
Disparate Income, Wealth and Opportunity: Implications for Social Insurance
